What is It?

Reading books together is a great way to boost early literacy (learning to read and write), especially when shared with a caring adult. Exposure to different kinds of books also opens doors to new sights, experiences, and connections, helping to create strong foundations for a child's lifetime of learning.

Tips and Activities

- Visit your local library and introduce yourself and your child to the children's librarian. If your child is old enough, they can sign up for a library card, or you can use your own and help them explore and choose picture books to borrow. Ask the librarian to help you locate books on your child's favorite topics. While you're there, sign up for the free story hours.
 - Books are everywhere! See where you can find a picture book to read together wherever you go. Look for them at the pediatrician's office and bring books along whenever you will be waiting at the bank, bus stop, or hairdresser. Bath time is also a great time to share books; vinyl bath books can be kept by the tub or shower for your child to grab, chew on, and play with in the water.
 - *Embrace conversation!* Talking with your child increases their vocabulary and also helps them learn to read. Even your infant can talk back and forth with you; when they babble, imitate their babble back, and then introduce new sounds for them to copy.
